The **POLITENESS** Protocol:

We must be nice and polite. We must take care not to offend others. We must keep conversations light, friendly, and noncontroversial. We must avoid conflict.

We must embody different selves to maintain social harmony:

Authentic Self

Who I really am:

fears related to race

express them when I'm not conscious or not worried about being

Ideal Self

Who I want to be:

I want to have about race

myself, confusing my authentic self

Tactical Self

Who I present to others:

The **ACADEMIC** Protocol:

We must separate the mind from the body. We must be objective. We must be rational. We must prioritize concrete, observable evidence. We must pursue a linear, logical path towards truth. We must create binaries and seek universality.

We must obey these basic mandates of Western science:

Empiricism over Experience

The personal and the intimate become intellectualized and

Storytelling is not considered evidence.

Intuition is dismissed.

Reason over **Emotion**

Emotions are considered Disruptive, **D**ysfunctional, and Disrespectful.

It is assumed that when topics are discussed calmly.

Reductionism over Complexity

Phenomena must be broken down into distinct and separate

Contradictions, ambiguities, and irresolvability are undesirable.

The **COLOR-BLIND** Protocol:

We must pretend that racial difference does not exist, that we are not aware of racial difference, or that we are not affected by racial difference. We must maintain innocence, naiveté, and oblivion with regards to racial difference.

We must continuously practice these forms of evasion:

Color **Evasion**

"I don't see color!" "We're all the same"

Implicit idea:

Stereotype Evasión

"I don't have any other races"

Consciously: reject

Unconsciously: respond on basis of unacknowledged biases

Power **Evasion**

"I don't have any special hard work"

If I don't **know** about racial **do** anything about it.
